- in the 1950s with the development of digital systems,
- communication and rapid advances in computing power

- The Fourth Industrial Revolution

- the advent of “cyber-physical systems” involving entirely new capabilities for people and machines



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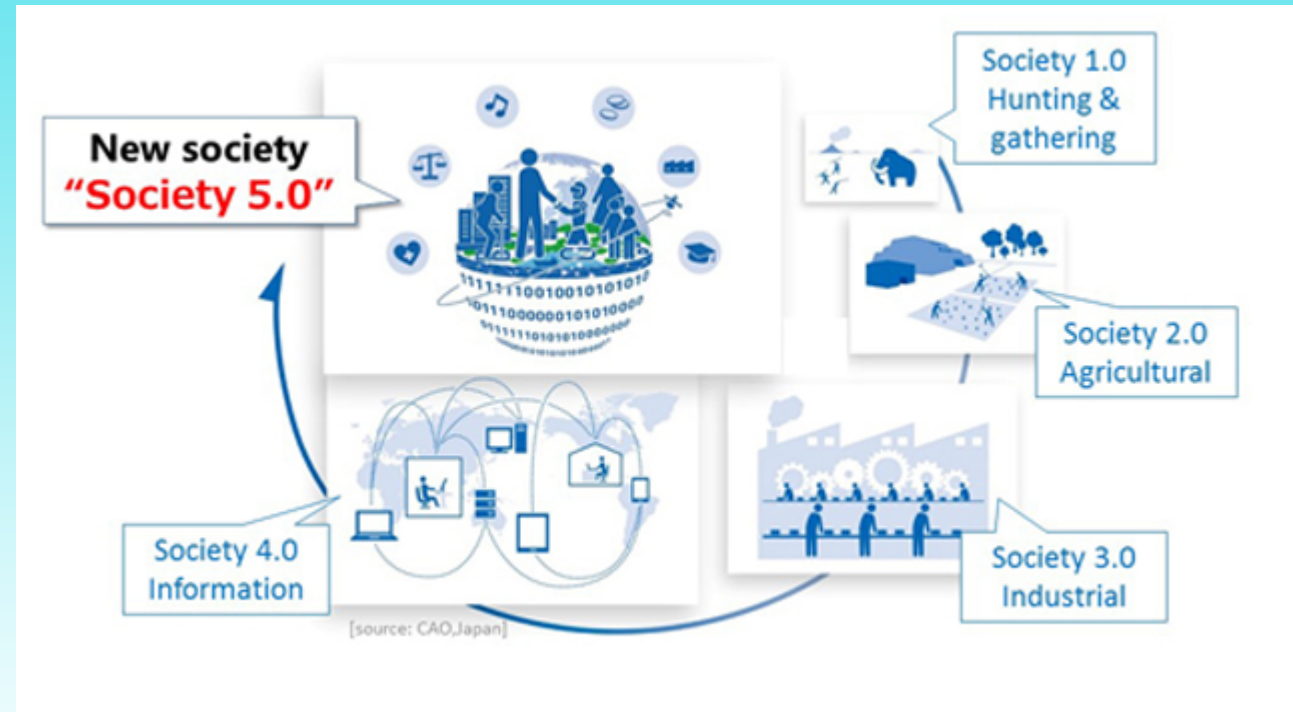
